


Bulletin Board of Tracks

<u>Introduction:</u> During this activity, your students will have a chance to create their own Tracks Bulletin Board. This will give them a chance to make something that will get them prepared for their class at Driftwood. It is recommended that before the class period library books on animals tracks/prints, and local animals be checked out of the library.

<u>Directions:</u> Have the students work in groups or as a single student to research a little about a particular animal and its prints. The students will draw or create in some way the print of their animal and a drawing of their animal. Make sure the animal's name is with the print. [To adjust this activity for a higher grade level, ask older students to also include some facts about the animals such as other markings their animal might leave behind.] Below are some prints from example mammals.


Brush Rabbit



Domestic Cat





Whose Track Is That???


<u>Directions:</u> Using the cards, the students must turn the cards over face down on the ground in a scattered position. One student at a time must turn one card over and then try to find its match. If the match is not found on the first try the student must turn both cards over and the turn moves to the next student. Only once a true match of cards is found can the pair of cards be set to the side. When a student finds a match by using his or her memory they may take another turn.
